
2. Students (and their welfare)

Student well-being programs

The school has a strong focus on wellbeing and in this is reflected in the range of programs offered to students. This includes; Common Groun, and Operation Flinders (selected students).

- Year Level managers also work as part of the wellbeing team. Students has access to an Interoception space in the learning Support Hub.
- The school has strong links with a number of agencies who periodically deliver programmes in conjunction with the well-being team. These include Inner Northern Health Services, NACYS and CAHMS.

Student Management

The school operates in alignment with the Department for Education's guidelines, prioritising clear expectations, accountability, and the promotion of responsible behaviour. Subject teachers implement class rules and routines; however, if behaviour disrupts the learning of others, the use of the Reset Room is employed to support the development of positive behaviour. Restorative practices are integral to the process of re-entry into classes and the resolution of issues as they occur. Early communication with parents—preferably via email or phone—is strongly encouraged to foster collaboration and support.

: Our school has a proud tradition of fostering student leadership. Prefects are elected from Years 10 to 12, and Student Representative Council (SRC) members are elected from Years 7 to 9. Students actively participate in various school committees, including representation on the Governing Council, demonstrating their valuable contributions to school governance and decision-making processes.

: We provide a variety of tailored learning provisions within our classes, including specialised alternative learning programs designed to meet the unique needs of our students.

Supporting Students with Special Learning Needs


Students with special learning needs are supported through a dedicated team of Learning Support staff, led by the Assistant Principal. Support is offered both in the classroom and through the Learning Support Centre. Additional features include:

- Small Literacy and Numeracy Intervention Classes: Provided for Years 8–11 students to enhance foundational skills.
- QuickSmart and MacqLit Intervention Programs: Offered to students in Years 8 and 9 to target specific learning needs in literacy and numeracy.

Special Curriculum Features









The school delivers specialised curriculum initiatives that strengthen pathways for vocational and career-focused learning. Key features include:

- Vocational Education and Training (VET): An integral component of the senior school program, enabling students to combine school learning with work or training opportunities.
- Trade Training Centre: Providing access to Certificate-level studies in areas such as Doorways 2 Construction, Heritage Trades, Automotive, Agriculture, Hospitality, and Engineering, benefitting students across the region.
- Career Development Strategy: School-led initiatives funded to introduce enhanced career development pathways and support student transitions into the workforce or further education.

Teaching methodology:

- The Berry Street Education Model (BSEM) is an evidence-based approach that promotes student wellbeing and engagement through trauma-informed teaching, positive psychology, and student-centred practices.
- At Kapunda High School, BSEM is integrated with the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) framework to ensure all students can achieve academically while fostering personal growth. Staff implement BSEM principles, such as building relational trust, creating predictable routines, and delivering inclusive teaching strategies, to establish a supportive, safe, and engaging learning environment. This alignment empowers students to reach their academic goals and develop essential skills for lifelong success.

Student assessment procedures and reporting:

Teachers use *Daymap* to provide feedback to students and their parents on a continual basis. Summary reports are issued at the end of each term; three-way interviews occur in mid term 2.

Joint programmes: Trade Training Centre, VET/Tafe, Construction Industry Training Board.

5. Sporting Activities

The school prioritises fostering a positive and inclusive environment by promoting student engagement through a wide range of social activities that build community connections both within the school and beyond.

Sporting Activities


- Annual Swimming Carnival and Athletics Day: Students actively participate in these events, with leading performers selected to represent the school in mid-north interschool carnivals.
- Participation in Regional and State Competitions: Students also have opportunities to attend swimming and athletics carnivals in Adelaide, as well as compete in various SASSA knockout competitions throughout the year.
- Lunchtime Sporting Activities: These are regularly organised on a home group basis to encourage teamwork, healthy competition, and active recreation.

- House Points and Passion Projects: Students collaborate in initiatives promoting leadership, teamwork, and contribution to school culture, further strengthening community bonds.
- Thing-A-Thon (Biannual Fundraising Activity):
 - Students participate in walk-based or activity-based challenges dedicated to supporting community causes.
 - The initiative includes fundraising efforts where participants collect sponsorships, with proceeds donated to a charity selected by students in consultation with the Student Representative Council (SRC).

6. Other Co-Curricular Activities

Celebrating the Arts and Co-Curricular Activities at Kapunda High School Kapunda High School proudly upholds traditions and offers a diverse range of arts and extracurricular activities that enrich student experiences, build relationships, and foster teamwork.

- Major Musical Productions: Staged biennially, these performances involve students across acting, singing, and stagecraft, showcasing their creative talents to the school community.
- Concert Band and Vocal Group: Regular rehearsals and performances celebrate Kapunda High School's vibrant arts culture.
- Instrumental Music Program: Weekly visits from experienced music teachers provide specialised lessons to escalate individual musical growth.
- Art Showcase Events: Annual exhibitions and presentations highlight student creativity in art, music, and drama, promoting a strong dedication to the arts culture at KHS.

Agricultural and Historical Extracurricular Activities

 'Ag' Club: A cherished tradition, this lunchtime activity allows students to engage with South Australia's agricultural heritage. Members represent KHS annually at The Royal Adelaide Show and compete with livestock teams, including cattle, sheep, and goats.

Outdoor Education and Camps

Kapunda High School offers varied camp experiences designed to foster student relationships, develop teamwork, and provide memorable outdoor adventures:

- Year 7 Mylor Adventure Camp: A fun and activity-filled experience that promotes relationship-building and team spirit among students.
- Year 9 Canberra Civics Camp: Encouraging civic awareness, this camp connects students with Australia's political and historical landmarks.
- Year 10 Snow Experience Camp (Mt. Hotham): A unique outdoor adventure that immerses students in snowy landscapes while promoting resilience and collaboration.
- Year 10 Aquatics Camp: Aligning with the SACE curriculum, this camp offers students the opportunity to gain 10 SACE credits while participating in water-based activities and developing skills in outdoor environments.
- Year 11 and 12 Camps: Offered based on Stage 1 and Stage 2 subjects, these camps may be conducted in collaboration with other schools and include crossmoderated programs to cater to specific educational needs.









Breakfast/Lunch Clubs run throughout the week Monday to Friday

One week's work experience is offered to year 10 and 11 students whilst others are engaged in work placement programmes on a regular basis. The school also fields teams in Australian Business Week.

The school is regularly involved in the University of South Australia's Connect to University programme which targets potential first-generation university students from within our Year 10 cohort. Uni visists blurb and academic culture, STEM girls University immersion days.

12. Further Comments

: Kapunda is Australia's oldest mining town and therefore attracts a number of tourists who are interested in history and heritage. The town is located within the Light Regional Council, one of the fastest growing council areas in South Australia.

Eringa Rebuild

Following a devastating fire at Kapunda High School, an extensive rebuild and restoration project for the historic 'Eringa' building is currently underway. The fire, which broke out on 29 March 2022, caused significant damage to the 147-year-old structure. The restoration process has been meticulously planned to ensure the building is made safe and salvaged in compliance with Heritage SA requirements.

The clean-up phase uncovered metres of debris in certain parts of the building, all of which has been carefully cleared piece by piece. Each item has been examined to determine whether it can be salvaged or repurposed as part of the restoration, reflecting the commitment to preserving the heritage of this iconic structure.

Originally constructed in 1876, 'Eringa' was generously donated by South Australian pastoralist Sir Sidney Kidman to the Department for Education in 1921. Over the years, the building has served various purposes including classrooms and a library, before being repurposed as the school's administration hub in 2010. The building underwent significant refurbishment during 2010–2011, funded by the South Australian Government, prior to the fire.

Restoration and construction work recommenced in september 2024, with the project scheduled for completion by mid-2026. The restoration aims to resurrect Eringa to reflect its original grandeur while integrating facilities designed to meet modern educational needs. The total cost of the project is forecast at approximately \$23 million.

This significant rebuild underscores Kapunda High School's commitment to honouring its rich history while providing newly appointed facilities for future generations.

The Kapunda High School Centenary Education Foundation was established as a member of the Country Education Foundation of Australia in 2011 from the original local foundation. It works to provide much needed financial assistance and support to local youth to help them achieve their post high school education, training and vocation aspirations.









Kapunda High School Centenary Education Foundation fundraises throughout the year and accepts donations from local residents and businesses in order to provide financial grants to students who need an extra helping hand. The funds come directly from your local community – none of it is government funded – celebrating the aspirations of local youth and working to help them achieve these aspirations. It's our way of saying "we believe in you and want to support your goals".

We support a diverse range of education and career pursuits including apprenticeships, traineeships, cadetships, degrees, diplomas and certificate level studies or entry careers. We do not provide cash grants directly to the recipients – the local foundation reimburses the student for a pre-agreed expense or pays the goods and services providers directly.
